

During July & August the usual "From the Pastor" column will be taking a vacation. Each week in its place will be a column from one of the Parish Staff. Today's column is from Fr. Dettmer.

"Everything else can wait. The search for God cannot wait."

That's a quote from the late George Harrison, the musician and one-time Beatle who, very early on in the midst of "Beatlemania," realized that there was more to life than fame, adulation, and material possessions. This realization led him to a life-long search for the divine in himself, others and the world. And while his journey of discovery may not have been the one that most of us would undertake, his search did bring him peace and understanding.

The quote reminds me that we are all on a similar journey, a similar search for God in our lives and in the world. It's a search in which we look to our faith to provide us answers to the really big questions of our lives such as why we're here and what it all means. As Christians, we believe that God has revealed to us all He wishes to tell us about himself in His Son, Jesus Christ. And yet, we know that there is always more we can discover about the presence of God in our lives and His plan for us and the world. Our search requires that we keep an open mind and an open heart at all times and that we have the sense of urgency which believes that there is something wondrous to be discovered in the nest person we meet, around the next corner we turn, in the next quiet moment of our day. The search for God requires from us humility as well, the knowledge that God is always greater than our understanding of Him at any given moment, either as individuals or as a community. After all, how can a finite mind hope to ever fully understand that which is infinite, the divine. Despite such limitations, however, we believe that our God is present to us always, constantly inviting us to a deeper understanding and a more intimate relationship with Him.

The summer months slow things down somewhat for many of us, perhaps giving us a little more time for reflection and prayer. May these months offer each of us the opportunity to discover more about our God and his love for us.

I hope that this summer is truly a time when, in the words of the late John Denver, "you can talk to God and listen to the casual reply."

Have a great summer and, once again, thank you all for your kind thoughts and words throughout the year.



Having reached the parish goal of \$93,701 all gifts over goal come directly back to the parish. This depends on each of us fulfilling our promised gift.



Re:	Update on Bishop DiMarzio's recovery
Date:	Monday, July 06, 2009

Allow me to provide you an update regarding Bishop DiMarzio's continued recovery from his recent by-pass surgery.

At the end of last week, the Bishop experienced a persistent nose bleed and he was taken to a local hospital where the emergency room doctor temporarily packed his nose and stopped the bleeding. The following day the Bishop went for a post-operative visit to his cardiac surgeon who then referred him to an otorhinolaryngologist. The doctor believed the bleeding would stop on its own. However, the Bishop continued to experience lingering weakness from the bleeding and was taken back to the hospital where he was admitted as a precaution. At some point, this week the doctors will determine what is the next step to permanently correct the problem.

Please continue to pray for the Bishop's ongoing recovery at the celebration of all Masses throughout the Diocese.

I will keep you informed of his progress in the days ahead.
