

Tomorrow, July 20th, marks the fortieth anniversary of the first men landing on the moon. I am sure that most of us who were alive at the time remember exactly where we were when Neil Armstrong took that "one small step for man, one giant leap for mankind." My family and I watched the moon landing at my grandparent's home, because they had a color TV. Of course, the first pictures from the moon were in fuzzy black and white, but that didn't seem to matter at the time. There was still that sense of awe and amazement that human beings were actually walking on the moon.

I remember the excitement of the Mercury, Gemini and Apollo programs throughout the 1960's. We would watch every launch into space, even in school, where our teachers would roll in an old TV and we would stop our usual lessons to watch mankind reach farther and farther beyond the bounds of the earth. It was truly a time of wonder, where it seemed that nothing was impossible for the human mind and spirit. Many of us believed that the lunar landing that July and those to follow in the ensuing years were but a preclude to reaching other planets in our solar system.

While that has not yet come to pass, the anniversary of the first lunar landing reminds us of the incredible power and drive of the human spirit. In those days there was the sense that human beings were constantly seeking to reach beyond the limitations that seem to hold us, not content to settle for the status quo. It seemed, at the time, that there was nothing that humanity could not accomplish. The anniversary of the first moon landing offers us an opportunity not only to recall these things, but to know that the same spirit lives in each of us. We each have the ability to reach beyond ourselves, the ability to do great things. Perhaps not on the scale of landing and walking on the moon, but things that can have a profound affect upon the worlds through which we travel. We can establish peace, if not in the whole world, at least in the small part that is ours. We can put an end to suffering, if not for all who suffer, at least for those we can. We can set right injustice, if not everywhere it exists, at least where we find it and can do something about it. After all, we've been to the moon.

So tomorrow, if you have a chance, look up at the moon and remember that you are a part of the humanity who walked upon it. When I look up, I'll be recalling the words to one of my favorite Psalms:

When I look to the heavens, at the moon and the stars you arrange, what is man that you should give him thought? Mortal man that you should care for him? Yet, you have made him little less than a god.


JUST A REMINDER

Having reached the parish goal of \$93,701 all gifts over goal come directly back to the parish. This depends on each of us fulfilling our promised gift.



RITE OF CHRISTIAN INITIATION OF ADULTS RCIA

Are you an adult who has never been baptized?

Are you baptized in another Christian denomination and interested in membership in becoming a Catholic?

Are you baptized Catholic who has not received the Sacraments of Eucharist and Confirmation?

If you answer yes to any of these questions, you may want to consider becoming part of the Rite of Christian Initiation for Adults (RCIA). This is a gradual process by which a person enters the life of the Church. It entails study, faith sharing, Scripture reflection, and rites (steps along the way, celebrated with the faith community).

This process or faith journey begins with a period of inquiry. We invite you to come and explore!

Census 2010

The U.S. Census Bureau is issuing a call to action for every resident of our nation: **"BE COUNTED IN 2010."**

The Census: A Snapshot

- What: The census is a count of everyone residing in the United States.
- ▲ Who: All U.S. residents must be counted—people of all races and ethnic groups, both citizens and non-citizens.
- When: Census Day is April 1, 2010. Questionnaire responses should represent the household as it exists on this day. More detailed socioeconomic information will be collected annually from a small percentage of the population through the American Community Survey.
- ▲ Why: The U.S. Constitution requires a national census once every 10 years. The census will show state population counts and determine representation in the U.S. House of Representatives.
- How: Census questionnaires will be delivered or mailed to households via U.S. mail in March 2010; many households will receive a replacement questionnaire in early April. Census workers also will visit households that do not return questionnaires.

A Complete Count: The Importance of Census Data

- Every year, the federal government can allocate more than \$300 billion to states and communities based, in part, on census data.
- Census data guide local decision-makers on where to build new roads, hospitals, child-care and senior citizen centers, schools, and more.
- Businesses use census data to locate supermarkets, new housing and other facilities.
- Census data determine how many seats each state will have in the U.S. House of Representatives.

2010 Census Questionnaire: Quick, Easy and Confidential

- With only 10 questions, the 2010 Census questionnaire is one of the shortest questionnaires in history and takes just 10 minutes to complete.
- By law, the Census Bureau cannot share an individual's census questionnaire responses with anyone, including other federal agencies and law enforcement entities.
